## Why we need your support

Kelley was diagnosed with Tetralogy of Fallot (TOF) when she was just eight weeks old. TOF is a rare, life-threatening anomaly of four heart defects that dramatically affects blood flow through the heart.

Forty years ago, when Kelly was born, the chance of surviving TOF was only 40 per cent. Now, thanks to significant advances in medical technology, that chance has risen to 95 per cent.

Thankfully, Kelley lived well past the expectations of her doctors, but the night before her 24th birthday, St Andrew's War Memorial Hospital became a critical part of her life.

After she started having dizzy spells and was rushed to her doctor, Kelley was found to be at

risk of sudden cardiac death. The only thing that could save her life was an Implantable Cardioverter – a device implanted inside the body that performs cardioversion, defibrillation, and pacing of the heart. With these capabilities, it can correct most life-threatening cardiac arrhythmias.

Kelley spent her 24th birthday in surgery and survived her ordeal, thanks to the incredible team at St Andrew's War Memorial Hospital and the ongoing support, expertise and life-saving medical technology available. She now enjoys a fulfilling life and career, and has a family – something she was never sure she'd be able to do.

## Saving lives every day

St Andrew's War Memorial Hospital is committed to improving outcomes for rural and regional Queenslanders. We believe in providing access to quality care no matter where you live in Queensland, closing the gap and preventing more lives being lost to heart disease.

The Heart of Australia Program is an incredible initiative by engineer-turned-cardiologist, Dr Rolf Gomes, which delivers vital cardiac services to rural and regional areas of Queensland from the back of a 25m-long semi-trailer.

This is a custom-built, \$1.5 million Kenworth K200 prime mover, featuring two private clinic rooms, a testing room, and a reception area for patients.

The truck enables the delivery of regular clinics, services and infrastructure that were previously unavailable to rural and remote areas. St Andrew's War Memorial Hospital has fitted out the truck with state-of-the-art cardiology diagnostic equipment.

In addition, our cardiologists support the service, flying out to work in the truck wherever it goes, providing diagnosis, treatment and follow-up for a range of cardiovascular and respiratory conditions.

# Since beginning its life-saving journey through Queensland in 2010:

 The Heart Bus has seen 4,465 patients in communities in southwest and central-west Queensland. There are also plans to expand into northwest Queensland. During its first 12 months of operation, the Heart of Australia saw 2,500 patients, and identified 76 urgent cases, including 13 people who needed open-heart surgery.



## Belle's Journey

Belle's journey with St Andrew's War Memorial Hospital started suddenly and unexpectedly when she suffered a life-changing stroke at 28. It left her without movement on her left side and unable to take care of herself. It was even more distressing



that there were no warning signs. Belle was young and healthy, and had no family history of stroke.

She was rushed to St Andrew's War Memorial Hospital and started on her long road to recovery. Thankfully, the team at St Andrew's War Memorial Hospital were there for Belle when she needed them most. After one week of slow progress and uncertainty in the neurology ward, Belle was moved to the rehabilitation ward. Our expert therapy team decided on an intensive rehabilitation program of physiotherapy and occupational therapy – every day, three hours a day, for four weeks.

"Walking is something we just take for granted,"
Belle remembers. "Now I had to think of every single
thing, every single step. It was so intense. I am
so thankful I had the St Andrew's War Memorial

Hospital team to help me. I would not have recovered as well as I have without that intense rehab work."

Thanks to the dedicated team of therapists, quality rehabilitation care, and her determination, Belle walked out of hospital on her own, one step after the other. She says it was an incredibly emotional experience to walk out the front door and finally feel independent again.
